What's New in 2019

Outdoor Fitness Equipment in **MECCA**

New outdoor circuit training equipment was installed at the Mecca Community Center & Pool (made possible in 2019 through grant support from Big Horn CARES). This equipment enhances the exercise activities offered such as Zumba and martial arts, as well as outdoor activities in Mecca like swimming and softball, to help promote a healthy lifestyle.



NORTH SHORE PARK

The District opened its newest park in 2019: Nuestro Lugar Park is a 5-acre park in North Shore. The park features a shaded pavilion, a restroom/bike shop building, soccer field, skate plaza, sport court, playground, walking path, and native plantings. The park creates a harmonious design between the natural desert landscape and the designed park elements, and to showcase innovative ways to design for water management, habitat enhancement, and climate control in the unique Salton Sea ecosystem.



FRITZ BURNS POOL

The Fritz Burns Pool in La Qunita is now open year-round with the installation of new heaters in 2019. The pool is open for lap swims and various water aerobics classes – including arthritis and multiple sclerosis therapy – and now also has extended hours into the evening. The District also offers classes for Adult Water Walking, Adult Water Aerobics, Aqua Fit, and Senior Splash.



What's New in 2020

Joint Powers & CVMC SHUMWAY RANCH



Desert Recreation District and the Coachella Valley Mountains Conservancy (CVMC) will enter into a Joint Powers Agreement in early 2020 with the goal to partner in providing

management and stewardship of properties and resources the two organizations have in common to the pursuit of their respective missions.

Our first joint project will be the management, renovation, and restoration of Shumway Ranch purchased by the state in 2017. The CVMC has teamed up with the Wildlife Conservation Board and the California Department of Fish and Wildlife to preserve the land and give bighorn sheep and other wildlife a natural habitat to occupy. The District will provide maintenance oversight as well as coordinate specific renovation projects that will complement the properties wildlife preservation mission and allow the ranch to be appropriately accessible to the public for small group educational opportunities.

Annexation of CATHEDRAL CITY

The Cathedral City Council is moving forward in consideration of annexing into the Desert Recreation District to provide park maintenance services and recreation programs to Cathedral City residents. The annexation would provide for the maintenance of Ocotillo, Century, Panorama parks and possible future development opportunities managed by the District. The annexation is scheduled to appear on the November 2020 ballot in Cathedral City.

The annexation and partnership between the City and the District will provide for enhanced maintenance and programming at the Cathedral City Parks utilizing District staff, programming expertise, and efficient maintenance support.

MASTER PLAN PROJECT for the Valley

With consulting support from GreenPlay of Louisville, CO, a national leading firm in the area of parks, recreation and open space consulting, and RCC Associates of Boulder, CO, a strategic market research firm for the tourism and recreation industries, Desert Recreation District will be finalizing its Master Plan for the Valley. The plan will determine appropriate facility opportunities for the District and its partners, and for the coordination of nonduplication of existing and planned services.

The Master Plan will provide a custom approach the Valley's unique challenges and opportunities that will coordinate desired outcomes for the communities served by DRD and its partners, consider the resources and limitations available, and provide a design template for future development and partnership opportunities.



Renovation & New Construction

THE GOLF CENTER

The Golf Center at Palm Desert, also home of The First Tee of the Coachella Valley, is receiving a major overhaul and is scheduled to be completed in the Fall of 2019. Improvements made as part of the renovation will include an additional 20 driving range decks allowing more people to be on the range at one time. A new irrigation system will be installed that will provide more efficient water usage and enhance water conservation; nighttime lights will be installed allowing the range to be open later in the evenings.

The Golf Center is a 9-hole Par 3 golf course with great western views conveniently located in the heart of the Valley. The practice facility will be open to the public seven days a week including most holidays.

RENTALS

The District serviced **3,970** rental reservations this past fiscal year, which totaled **18,356** hours of time at ballfields, swim and birthday parties, graduation celebrations, business gatherings and more!

PALM DESERT Renovations



Visitors to the Palm Desert Civic Center Park will notice a brand-new look and structure changes when visiting our Palm Desert Community Center in the future. On the exterior a façade upgrade will include new exterior shape and colors, more glass openings, and drought tolerant landscaping. The interior renovations and remodel will include an expanded lobby flanked by a remodeled weight room to the left and an exercise/dance studio to the right.

The center's preschool currently sits in the front of the building and shares the main entrance with anyone entering the Palm Desert Community Center. Relocating the preschool to the northeast end of the building will provide parents with a dedicated drop-off location and a preschool-only playground.

OASIS, MECCA, and THERMAL Parks

OASIS: The Oasis Community Park is the second of three community parks that the District is developing in the eastern Coachella Valley. Applications for grants have been submitted to several organizations and at this time the District has been awarded \$2.35 million in funding to support the creation of this park.

MECCA: In partnership with the Riverside County Economic Development Agency, the District will be part of developing the Mecca Regional Sports Park Project. The Project will not only provide access to soccer fields, sports courts, walking trails and open space but will also provide flood mitigation and environmental benefits to the community.

THERMAL: Desert Recreation District has acquired 4.38-acres from the County of Riverside and located on the corner of Church and Olive streets in Thermal. The initial steps in the design process have started to develop a park serving those in and around the community of Thermal.



Engaging Community

AFTER SCHOOL Programs

Desert Recreation District has been offering After School Programs in partnership with Desert Sands Unified School District (DSUSD) since 2002. The District's programs offer a place to keep kids safe, active, and happy after school. Activities include homework assistance, art projects, physical enrichment, collaborative group games and hanging out with friends – and a daily snack is provided along with nutrition education. These programs all follow the DSUSD School Year Calendar.

ACTIVE ADULT and SENIOR PROGRAMS

Active adults and seniors can participate in classes such as Fit After 50, Golden Parachutes, or Zumba Gold at one of our Senior Centers to stay fit and healthy in both mind and body. Participants can also enjoy art and music classes, listen to guest speakers, share a meal together, or join a field trip.

The District partners with the city of Palm Desert each year to host the Palm Desert Senior Games & International Sports Festival. The 2019 games were held February 4 – 9, 2019 at various venues in the Coachella Valley. What started as a local event has expanded to the current Senior Games that are now recognized throughout the region.

DRD Senior VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR

Ernestina Salas has been an active senior participant at the Thermal Senior Program for over 10 years. She has been a great asset to the program and to the community. Ernestina is always willing to lend a hand, provide our team members with feedback on program improvements, encourages other seniors to be active and to participate, and makes people feel welcomed.

We can consistently count on her to be the first to volunteer to help when needed. Ernestina is a valuable asset to the community of Thermal as well as to the District.



Engaging Programs

ROBOTICS PROGRAM

Desert Recreation District's Creative Brain Robotics classes and camps offer kids from 7 to 17 an in-depth exploration of robotics, electronics, engineering and creativity and innovation. Participants design robots and program them to perform specific tasks. At the completion of the course, Creative Brain provides each kid with a fully programmable robot to take home and to continue to build and program.

Several educational standards are covered including Science, Technology, Engineering, Math, Language Arts, Biology (specifically Human Anatomy), Visual Arts and more. Students are encouraged to think creatively, problem-solve effectively, be imaginative and inventive.



CV RADIO CONTROL CLUB

The Coachella Valley Radio Control Club is based near Coachella in Riverside County, California. It is one of the oldest model aircraft clubs in the United States, one of the oldest non-profit service organizations in continuous existence in the Coachella Valley and one of the few Academy of Model Aeronautics gold-certified clubs in the country.

In partnership with the United States Bureau of Reclamation, Desert Recreation District is able to manage and support an ideal site of 240 acres for the club's use along-side the All American Canal in an unincorporated area off Avenue 54 and Pierce Street near Coachella. The site not only had ideal flying conditions, but an ideal arrangement as well with an initial twenty-five-year lease at only US\$1 per year with renewal options for another twenty-five years at the lease's expiration.



JR HISTORIANS

Desert Recreation District will now be supporting the management of the Junior Historians Program at Indio's Coachella Valley History Museum and its historical schoolhouse. Through the museum's Junior Historian program, children from Indio and surrounding communities learn practical skills, old-fashioned games and the history of the Coachella Valley as the museum.

The program fills in the gaps of historical education most public schools are unable to fill and aims to instill an appreciation of history by offering activities and programs on-site at the museum. The District's staff will support on-site programming that helps students learn more about the community where they live and to take pride in their local community.



Engaging Programs

DOG SCENT PROGRAMS

The District's dog scent classes utilize a dog's desire to hunt and their love of food and toys in developing their scent abilities. The classes are for dog and owner teams to further their knowledge and skills in scent detection training from Novice to Detective Dog.

Teams learn how to encourage and develop a dog's natural scenting abilities, introduce a dog to several target odors that they will be trained to locate, and introduction to challenge elements: Vehicles, Interiors and Exteriors.

VETERANS

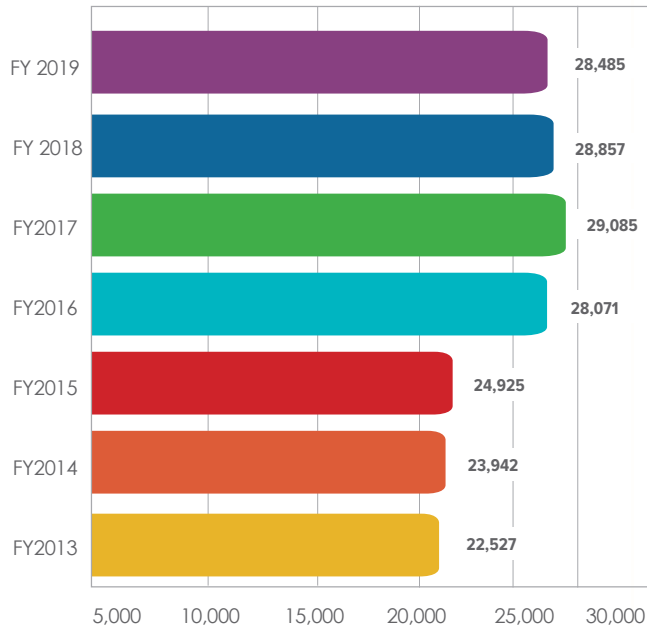
The District continues to create and support programs that are geared toward supporting veterans in the Coachella Valley. The District's programs not only provide recreational and therapeutic support to veterans and their families but also raise awareness toward increasing support to honor Coachella Valley veterans.

The District's past partnerships have included working with Mission Veterans to start the Coachella Valley Mission Veteran Guitar program to support music therapy opportunities for veterans; and the Coachella Valley Horse Rescue to support veteran's participation in their equine therapy program Engaging Heroes.

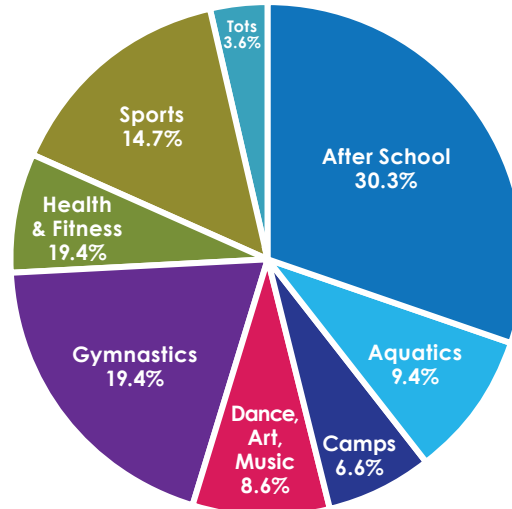

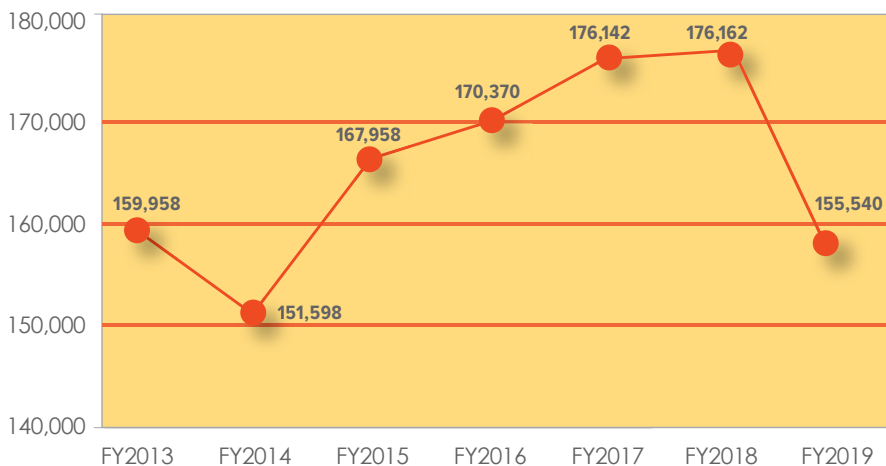

Upcoming Programs

CAL FRESH

Desert Recreation District's funding from the CalFresh Healthy Living Program through the Riverside University Health System will help promote increased access to healthy foods and beverages, promoting drinking water as the beverage of choice, as well as increasing physical activity as part of a daily family routine.

The program will serve Coachella, Indio, Mecca, Thermal, and Thousand Palms through events and activities held in the District's parks and community centers with health fairs, special events, and fitness programs for families on the weekends and in the early evenings. The program focuses on community input to tailor make a program that meets local needs. The District will receive continued funding from the CalFresh program over the next three years.

HABITAT CONSERVATION FUND

Desert Recreation District received a grant from the Habitat Conservation Fund to promote wildlife area activities to youth in the Coachella Valley. Through our Trips for Kids Coachella Valley and ROC (Recreation Outdoor Club) activities, these youth residents will be exposed to park and wildlife areas that they may not otherwise experience.

In the Trips for Kids program, participants will take part in activities that include bicycle safety tutorials, docent-led hikes to identify native species, habitat restoration outings, outdoor equipment tutorials, and hands-on outdoor education along with taking part in instructor-led mountain bike rides so all participants can experience the joy of riding a bike and have the freedom to explore the natural world on two wheels.

The ROC program will help cultivate the following: (1) development of a great appreciation for the "great outdoors"; (2) increased physical activity; (3) improved mental health; (4) community interaction; (5) understanding habitat protection and environmental impact, and (6) environmental stewardship.

Expanding Programming

ADAPTIVE/THERAPEUTIC SPORTS

Desert Recreation District's Adaptive/Therapeutic Sports & Recreation program has been recognized as a leader in the field and the premier provider of adaptive programs in the valley. Adaptive sports and recreation activities are available for those individuals with special needs/disabilities. Any individual with a physician diagnosed disability can participate in the District's adaptive programs which address intellectual, developmental, cognitive and/or physical challenges.

The District's adaptive programs use sports and recreation activities as an enjoyable method to address the individual needs of each participant while learning or improving skills. These programs often run parallel to typical sports and can provide a means for improvement in psychological and physical as well as overall well-being. The District's Adaptive/Therapeutic Sports & Recreation program strives for participants to progress into standard District programs with the use of skills learned in adaptive programs.

YOUTH GOLF FOUNDATION

The Coachella Valley Youth Golf Foundation was formed by Desert Recreation District in 2019. The new foundation will solely support and will be the fundraising arm of The First Tee of the Coachella Valley program at the District's Golf Center. The First Tee of the Coachella Valley program provides a safe, healthy, and positive environment to teach students golf skills through the program's curriculum: The First Tee Life Skills Experience consists of a curriculum developed by experts in the field of positive youth development and is delivered by trained coaches.

The Coachella Valley Youth Golf Foundation's new board of directors is made up almost entirely from The First Tee's original Advisory Board providing continuity and continued support to the thriving program located at the District's Golf Center as well as operating in 26 local schools. The First Tee of the Coachella Valley program is one of the more than 175 chapters around the United States.



ADAPTIVE/THERAPEUTIC SPORTS & RECREATION

Since the start of DRD's Adaptive/Therapeutic Sports Program in 2017, **1,696** participants with special needs and disabilities have taken part in these classes and events!

ASSETS

While utilizing a regional approach has eliminated redundancy in facilities (several locations have been repurposed to round out our offerings), investment in renovating or replacing aging infrastructure is a top priority. We are also enhancing service areas with the development of new parks and facilities.

The District is known an employer of choice in the Coachella Valley providing a collaborative team atmosphere offering opportunities, developing skills, and rewarding excellence. The District maintains an environment of inclusion and respect reflecting the broad diversity of our valley communities and is committed to recruiting, developing, and retaining the best talent possible to ensure a positive work experience.

INFORMATION SYSTEMS/ TECHNOLOGY

The information stations at District facilities make access to information convenient, and tasks such as searching our employment portal are easily accomplished thanks to the improved network infrastructure and wireless service now in place. Staff are equipped with mobile devices allowing them to be out in community while staying connected to needed resources for ongoing operations and decision-making.

REPUTATION

The District is known to use a community collaborative approach to provide quality, barrier-free, and safe recreational activities that contribute to the overall wellness of the citizens of the Coachella Valley. The cooperative spirit borne from this approach has made the District a trusted resource for community services as well as an established leader in parks and recreation.

FUNDING

The District has implemented a long-term financial plan that enables careful financial management, accountability for revenue, spending and public funds, and a capital improvements program that ensures we stay on solid fiscal ground. So that the District can offer financial assistance to those who may not otherwise be able to participate in recreational activities, additional funding sources such as grants, donations, sponsorships, and partnerships are sought out to enhance the funds available for equipment, facilities, and community services.

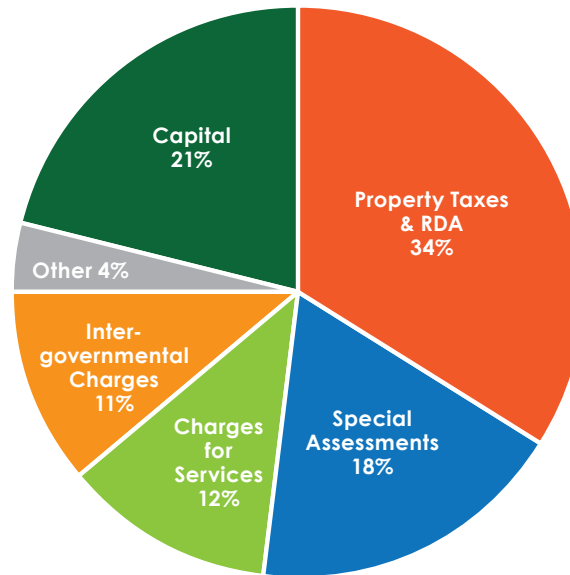

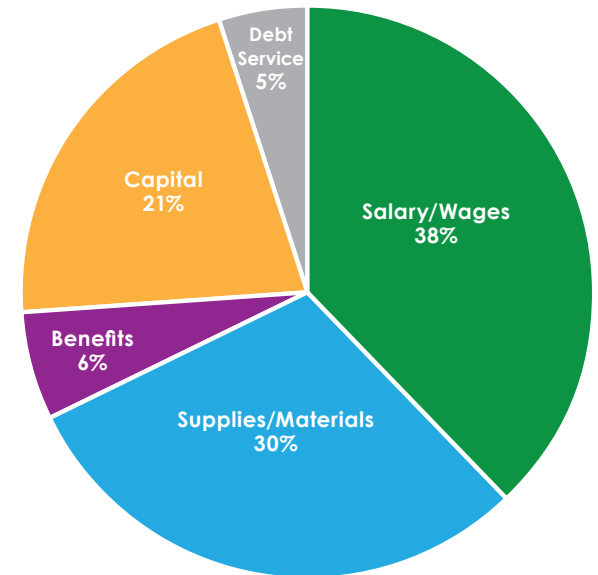
